Medicare eligible people with diabetes can get a dilated eye exam to check for diabetic eye disease, including diabetic retinopathy. This also includes those with a history or a family history of glaucoma. Patients must pay 20 percent of the Medicare-approved amount after the yearly Part B deductible. Valid AAA Membership provides Vision Care discounts. AAA works with Pearl Vision, Lens Crafters, Target Optical and EyeMed providers to provide discounted services. This offer expires 12/31/2020.

Eye Wear Shopping Options:

Buying nonprescription reading glasses at a hardware store or the dollar stores can save a bundle. Don't pay top dollar from drugstores.

For prescription eyewear, if you like designer frames, <u>Consumer Reports</u>, states Luxottica, a manufacturer of frames for Chanel, Prada and Versace, also produces styles for Lens Crafters, Pearle Vision, Sears Optical and Target Optical. Raters of eyeglasses retailers listed Costco with top honors. Walmart also did well. Good to know.

Buying Online:

Buying Online eyeglasses is not for complex prescriptions. When deciding to buy eyewear online, choose vendors licensed in the United States, where safety standards and optical quality are high. Make sure you are offered a return policy, warranty or guarantee. That said, you can find some great deals and promotional codes to sweeten the deal.
